Articling Term

The Nova Scotia articling term is 12 months.





Principal required to article

Students require a principal or supervising lawyer to apply to article.

A principal may be:

- A practicing lawyer in Nova Scotia,
- A law firm where one lawyer in the firm is named as supervising lawyer.
- Supervising Lawyer will oversee the training of one or more clerks in conjunction with other participating lawyers in the firm or organization.

Criminal Record Check (applicant not required to submit – NSBS will run application through mybackcheck.com)

Photo ID (notarized, colour copy, government-issued)



Important dates

- ✓ Registration with CPLED for PREP or Accelerated PREP – See CPLED website for dates and details
- ✓ Articling applications should be submitted to the NSBS by April 1 to ensure a June 1st start date.





Documents submitted by your Principal



Articling plan, Articling agreement, Education Plan



Must be approved by Nova Scotia Barristers' Society



Education plan is based on competency framework and describes how you will be taught, supervised and provided with feedback in the various lawyering and practice management skills as well as professional responsibility



Options for Articled Clerks





Reporting Requirements



Your principal will submit a Mid-term Report (approximately half-way through articling year) and Final Report describing the experience received in the various skills during your articles.

You will participate in the preparation of the reports.

All Requirements to be completed

You will be eligible for admission to the Nova Scotia Bar once you:

- Successfully complete your articles and all documentation has been submitted
- Successfully complete PREP or Accelerated PREP, and
- Attend the Cultural Competency Workshop (typically offered in Spring and fall).





Admission to the Nova Scotia Bar

We will contact you when it is time to submit admission documentation:

- Final Report
- Certificate of Principal
- Statement of Good Character
- Oath/Affirmation, Biography, Order

– Fees

Calls typically take place in January, April, June, and November.
